Nutana Community Association President's Message

Broadway 360° Plan

The Broadway 360° development plan will be working its way through council during April and May this year. The Nutana Community Association, together with the City of Saskatoon and the Broadway Business Improvement District, have formed this exciting proposal, which brings resolution to several outstanding issues that were never dealt with in our local area plan 10 years ago.

Infill guidelines

The City of Saskatoon has recognized the importance of neighbourhood intensification in charting a financially viable city in the future. We understand the challenges that will go along with this and have worked hard in collaboration with other community associations to start discussion on infill guidelines and regulations, to accompany the discussion of intensification; this is to ensure that it is not just about fitting more residents into an existing neighbourhood, but about shaping better-quality and more appropriate neighbourhood development.

There is a whole new set of tools which many other cities have adopted in the face of these challenges, and they have inspired the development of more context-sensitive, community-friendly, well-mannered, and appropriately scaled construction. This is having tremendous results in the re-invigoration of older neighbourhoods into very high quality, vibrant, and attractive urban environments.

The City of Saskatoon has committed to the development of preliminary infill guidelines and regulations for existing neighbourhoods over the next year and a half, and the Nutana Community Association will be very involved in advancing this discussion.

NCA's Annual General Meeting

The Nutana Community Association extends a special welcome to all Nutana residents to attend our AGM on April 18th at 7 p.m., in the library of Nutana Collegiate. We have four main topics to present, which should be of great interest to all residents.

1. The NCA is excited to be introducing a proposal at the AGM to

develop a strategic plan for the Nutana area. A strategic plan is a high-level look at the general needs and interests of an area, which will help set the agenda for our association in the coming years.

- 2. We will also be presenting the details of our first ever "Sweep into Spring" Nutana lane cleanup event. See the enclosed flyer.
- 3. Another presentation will be an exciting proposal to develop a Nutana public bread oven, hopefully in the near future. Our guest speaker on this topic will be Bryn Rawlyk.
- 4. Lastly, we will be looking at a proposal to transform the Nutana Free Film Festival into a larger-profile public speaking event based on the notions of "Smart Growth/Healthy Cities". Our guest speakers on this topic at the meeting will be Kirby Wirchenko of the Broadway Theatre, and Peter Garden of Turning the Tide bookstore.

NCA Helps Send Oskayak Student to New Zealand

Seventeen grade-12 students from Oskayak High School had what they may well look back on as the experience of their lives when they visited New Zealand last July, along with four school staff members. This group also made history by being the largest-ever graduating class from the school. The 12-day trip, designed to offer the students an opportunity to experience another aboriginal culture, was made possible through a variety of grants from corporate and private donors and organizations. Nutana Community Association donated \$1,000 towards the expenses of one of the students, Labrina Shirley.

All grade 12 students were invited to apply for this opportunity; the trip was awarded on the

basis of academic achievement and on condition that they completed their studies and graduated before the trip.

In addition to organizing and preparing for the trip, Oskayak students produced a full-length documentary film of their planning, fundraising, and all the preparations necessary for the journey (including getting passports), and finally the journey itself, to the North Island of New Zealand. The staff of Bluehill Productions guided the students as they learned the communication and production technology skills needed to create the documentary.

The documentary was introduced to the public at a free screening at the Broadway Theatre in January this year.

Carys Gilbertson, Oskayak program facilitator for grades nine and 12, one of the accompanying staff members, reported that the trip was "unbelievable". The students were on task the entire

time, she said. They were all up early every day, prepared their breakfast, and were loaded on the bus by 9 a.m. for a unique, enjoyable, appreciated adventure. Highlights were experiencing the ocean, meeting the Maori people, and learning about and experiencing their culture.

Some experiences, as reported by Carys: visiting Auckland, the Coromandel Peninsula, bone carving at Whitianga, experiencing the ocean at Cathedral Cove, a Maori evening cultural performance, a feast, with food cooked below ground, learning and performing the Haka, exploring the Whakarewarewa thermal village, touring the Te Puia (New Zealand's Maori Arts and Crafts Institute), seeing geysers and caves, soaking in thermal rock pools, visiting the National Museum in Wellington — a great place for learning, with five floors of exhibitions — and finally driving back to Auckland and leaving for home.

New Gardeners Register on April 28th

Spring is here, and the Nutana Community Garden will once again be operating this summer from the parcel of land directly behind the Broadway Roastery, at 518 12th Street East. Registration for new gardeners will be held on Saturday, April 28th, right in the garden, from 11 a.m. till 1 p.m. The fee is \$25 and must be paid at the time of registration. There will be a very limited number of plots available, once last year's gardeners have confirmed their intentions to stay on or not. New plots are assigned on a first come first served basis. You may fill out the form ahead of time by downloading the 2012 gardener's agreement form from the Nutana Community Association web site at www.nutana.ca

Hard copies will be available at the registration table on the day of registration as well.

Returning gardeners from last year will have a chance to re-register for their plots beforehand. Each will be sent a new 2012 garden agreement form by e-mail; those without e-mail, please call Victoria School at 384-4322 to make other arrangements. All returning gardeners need to return the completed forms with full payment by April 21st to the registrar's home. Warren Chykowski 1964-2012

Warren Chykowski, a Nutana resident and quiet community supporter, passed away March 3, 2012.(a full obituary appeared in *The StarPhoenix* on March 6th).

He died while on holiday in Thailand. He was born July 23rd, 1964 in Saskatoon and grew up here. A registered respiratory therapist, working at Royal University Hospital in Saskatoon, he also held a Bachelor of Science degree in biology from the University of Saskatchewan.

Warren made his home in Nutana, and his love of growing things was evident in his lovely landscaped yard. Warren served on the Nutana Community Association for some years, as your representative to S.O.S. Elms, an organization dedicated to the preservation of the elm trees in Saskatoon's urban forest. Most recently, Warren worked with the Nutana Community Association Board on traffic calming in the neighbourhood, through the use of traffic circles. One of the locations considered was suggested by Warren, and was the one chosen for a trial model, at the intersection of 9th Street and McPherson Ave.

Idylwyld Rink Ends Busy Year on April 15th

The rink boards at Idylwyld Park will be coming down Sunday, April 15th, at 1 p.m., ending the very busy 2011–2012 skating season. Come out and help with this final task. With 10 or 12 helpers, it will take less than an hour.

The boards went up early in November, with flooding beginning that week. The rink was fully functional well before the school Christmas break, with many skaters immediately using it.


Rink activity was high morning, noon, and night. It's estimated we had around 2,500 skaters over three and a half months.

Major shovelling and flooding were done primarily by Greg Donnolly and me, along with neighbours Rick Schwinghammer and Pat Boot.

All flooding was done from the park water supply, generously donated by the City. Our only expense of the year was \$18 for a reducing widget which allowed three-quarter-inch hose operation from the park hydrant. After initially creating a three-inch ice base with the fire hoses, the surface was maintained with skim coating every three or four days. Someone bought us a couple of new nets, and shovels just seemed to show up!

Warm winter temperatures basically kept the rink busy. There has been a rink in this park every year since at least 1935 (more than 75 years) and this was the busiest year, with the best ice conditions, that people can recall.

City's New Strategic Plan

The City of Saskatoon has released transportation and development details of its strategic plan that will help guide City policy over the next decade.

City Manager Murray Totland says the two highlighted strategic goals build a solid foundation for the community to grow responsibly without the pitfalls of unrestrained expansion.

Among the seven goals contained within the plan, "sustainable growth" and "moving around" create the main framework for council decision-making and administrative policy-making over the next ten years.

Three main elements of the city's plan are 1) the need to move people to workplaces in the north end, at the University of Saskatchewan, and downtown; 2) the need to move people faster and more efficiently west and east, and; 3)

the need to build "in" and "up" along those key pathways instead of expanding out.

Planning and Development Manager Alan Wallace adds that the two strategic goals don't stand alone.

"For example, shorter commute times decrease costs, and they increase the quality of life," he says. Along with this objective, Wallace stresses the desire to create more "main street" areas similar to Broadway Avenue.

"If we create urban villages along routes where transit service is more frequent, it will help make 'moving around' less reliant on cars and trucks," he says.

"It's good for the environment, and it saves taxpayers money, because infill development takes advantage of the infrastructure that's already there."

The strategic plan was made possible in part with the help of the Federation of Canadian Municipalities and a \$333,771 grant from the Green Municipal Fund. The plan is posted on the City of Saskatoon web site; look for Strategic Plan under "S". Hard copies of the plan are available from the city manager's office.

Avenue H Closed for Two Years

Construction for the Avenue H reservoir expansion project requires traffic restrictions on avenues H and I, which will remain in place until the project is complete in approximately two years.

Avenue H is now closed between 11th Street and 12th Street and 11th Street is closed between Avenue H and Avenue I. Detour signs direct motorists via 17th Street and Avenue P. Local traffic access is available.

The Avenue H reservoir expansion project includes expanding the storage capacity for treated water (the reservoir), adding an ultraviolet (UV) disinfection system, and installing a new highlift pump station. This project, along with expansion of the 42nd Street reservoir scheduled to start later in 2012, will allow the City of Saskatoon to store more water to optimize water treatment plant operation, and provide additional capacity to meet the projected water demand based on Saskatoon's estimated 2016 population, while maintaining high water quality standards. 🥦


